


Employer optimism increases in the North West

After three successive quarters of declining hiring intentions, employer sentiment in the North West has improved going into 2016. With an Employment Outlook of +11%, employers in the region are amongst the most optimistic in the country when it comes to job creation for the first quarter of 2016.

Average weekly pay

At £528, average weekly pay in the North West is £44 lower than the national average.

Hiring Outlook

For the first quarter of 2016, the seasonally adjusted Net Employment Outlook in the North West has risen to +11%. The national average currently stands at +7%.

Employment


At **72.1%**, the North West rate of employment remains below the national average (73.7%) but has seen an increase of 1.5% since the same period last year.

Unemployment


Unemployment in the North West has fallen yearon-year, and at **5.5%**, the unemployment rate remains slightly higher than the national average.

Market overview
